

### Trustees signal support for more stop signs

Motorists driving through Hinsdale may soon need to pump the brakes a little more.

Hinsdale trustees Tuesday night discussed, as a first reading, converting two-way yield signs to two-way stop signs at nine intersections in the village in an effort to improve driver safety after several of the crossings experienced multiple crashes in recent years. At the request of residents, police conducted studies and recommended the changes at the following intersections:

- Eighth and Adams streets
- Eighth and Bodin streets
- Eighth and Bruner streets
- Eighth and Quincy streets

- Eighth and Stough streets
- Eighth and Thurlow streetsElm Street and Ravine Road
- Seventh and Monroe streets
- Seventh Street and Park Avenue

The studies involved analyzing the recommended sight distances for drivers on approach to the intersections as calculated based on the American Association of State Highway Officials' Green Book. The calculations were then compared to intersection measurements to ensure drivers have enough time and distance to identify a potential hazard and safely react to it.

The sight distances for the approaches to the intersections were reduced due to existing structures and privately maintained landscaping, the study found. Those obstructions meant the

recommended minimum sight distances were not satisfied, and two-way stop signs were deemed necessary.

The intersections' crash history and traffic volumes were also considered, but they did not meet the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices criteria for creating a multiway stop.

Trustee Luke Stifflear, chairman of the zoning and public safety committee, said other intersections were also reviewed as part of the study that did not meet the threshold for implementing changes.

"These standards for a control device to be installed should be met for the village to take any action," Stifflear said, noting Police Chief Brian King's admonition that too many traffic control devices will only serve to encourage drivers to ignore them.

Trustee Neale Byrnes spoke to the fact that most of the intersections addressed are in the village's southwest quadrant.

"There's a situation where we have a lot of intersections in the southwest area that basically look kind of the same in terms of sight distance and traffic patterns. Some would have a yield sign, some would have a stop sign. So we're making this more consistent," Byrnes said.

None of the trustees expressed opposition to the measure, and the ordinance was moved to the consent agenda for a vote at the board's Aug. 13 meeting.

Replacing the yield signs with stop signs at the nine intersections will cost about \$2,250.

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## Italy destination for work and pleasure

Hinsdale woman has toured every part of the country she hopes one day to call home

After years spent hearing tales of its beautiful landscapes, its delicious food and its rich culture and history, Roseanne Zammuto Cofoid finally got the chance to visit Italy in college.

That semester spent studying in Rome sparked a love affair that still burns to this day for the Hinsdale resident.

"I found myself going back whenever I could," she said. She sought out her Italian relatives, studied her Italian ancestry and even learned the language. Eventually, she turned her love of Italy into her own specialized travel business — La Dolce Via.

She returns to Italy at least three times a year, sometimes staying for an extended period of time as she revisits favorite spots and explores new opportunities for her clients. Over the last 15 years she has made more than 50 trips to nearly every corner of the country. "The only way to do it is to be

there," she said.

Her trips have helped her to discover places like Podere Il Casale, an organic farm in Tuscany where guests can learn to make bread, pizza and cheese, or just stop in for an authentic Italian meal.

"It's a little treasure," Zammuto Cofoid said.

Another discovery is the Enoteca Falorni, a wine shop set inside an ancient structure in Chianti. Guests can taste and purchase wine, olive oil and other local delicacies.

Zammuto Cofoid's favorite Italian destinations have changed throughout the years. Sicily and Puglia currently rank at the top of her list. Puglia, the southern region forming the heel of Italy's "boot," rests along the Adriatic sea. It's just across the sea from Greece and a bit more rustic and unexplored than many parts of Italy, Zammuto Cofoid said. It is known for its whitewashed hill towns, centuries-old farms and Mediterranean coastline.

To choose a favorite experience is as difficult as choosing a favorite city, Zammuto Cofoid said. But Matera, located in the arch of the boot, is one she won't soon forget. She recalled hiking through Murgia National Park, touring stone churches that date back to the 10th and 1th centuries, and dining in a cave overlooking a spectacular view of fields and mountains.

Whether they live in Italy's rolling countryside or in a crowded ancient city, Zammuto Cofoid said Italian people love to share their culture. That's one of the things she loves most.

love, said Zammuto Cofoid. Italy is a great destination for singles, couples, groups and families. She said even the pickiest young eaters can find something to savor on any Italian menu.

"There's always pizza and gelato," she said.

One day, Zammuto Cofoid hopes to make Italy not just her favorite vacation destination, but her home.

"It's something that's always been on my mind," she said.

In the meantime, she still has things to explore. Given the opportunity to plan a perfect day in Italy, Zammuto Cofoid said she would spend it walking through a town and discovering its shops, restaurants and people.

"I find that to be so invigorating," she said.

Her next trip, set for September, will feature a visit to Sardinia, an island north of Sicily. People there speak with a unique dialect and are surrounded by an abundance of natural beauty, Zammuto Cofoid said.

Italy has changed in the decades since Zammuto Cofoid spent that college semester in Rome. It's become more crowded with both tourists and residents, she said. But other things haven't changed — like the food, the wine and the people she is proud to call her own.

### Road construction on many nearby streets

In addition to navigating construction projects in the village, Hinsdale residents likely will be affected by road work underway in neighboring communities.

The following list of projects was compiled by village engineer Dan Deeter.

#### • Route 83 bridges

The Illinois Department of Transportation is working on the Route 83 bridges over Ogden Avenue and the BNSF railroad. Route 83 is restricted to one lane north and south with long back-ups. The project is scheduled to be completed Nov. 15.

#### • York Road

Oak Brook is installing a water main from the east side of York Road west down Luthin Road, requiring a utility cut across York. Residents should expect periodic traffic delays or lane closures on

York north of Old Mill Road (the entrance to the Graue Mill community). • Madison Street

Oak Brook has scheduled work on Madison from

Glendale Avenue to Spring Road to take place sometime this summer. Residents should expect traffic delays or detours

County Line Road

Burr Ridge will construct a sidewalk on the east side of County Line Road between Plainfield Road and 60th Street. The project is expected to occasionally affect traffic on County Line and 60th from July 22 to early September.

Ogden Avenue

IDOT is conducting utility and road work on Ogden from Main Street in Downers Grove to Cass Avenue. Traffic has been shifted and delays are to be expected.

#### **Clarification**

The Hinsdale Parks and Recreation Department employs the equivalent of 14.3 full-time employees this fiscal year. The actual number of employees, because many are part-time seasonal workers, is much higher. There are three full-time employees, five regular part-timers (working at the Lodge) and 75 or so seasonal pool staff.

## **Animal lover presents HHS with donation**

Florrie Tuthill continues her long-time support of humane society with generous gift

The Hinsdale Humane Society has been close to Florrie Tuthill's heart since she moved to Hinsdale in 1972 and began volunteering at the shelter.

"She's always been a dog nut and she's always believed it was healthy for young families to have pets," her son, Jay Tuthill of Hinsdale, said. "So her work with HHS started small but led nevertheless to where we are today."

Today the new Pet Rescue and Resource Center bears the Tuthill Family name, thanks to a \$1 million donation Florrie made to the humane society. The gift also honors her late husband, Jim, who passed away from complications of Parkinson's disease.

"Dad's been gone for four years now and my mom wanted to do something she knew would warm both their hearts," Jay said. "When she saw the exciting things going on at Hinsdale Humane Society, well, her search was over."

The donation is the largest in the organization's history, said Tom Van Winkle, executive director.

And while Florrie was hesitant for it to be made public, he convinced her doing so would benefit the society and the dogs and cats it serves.

"To us, it makes a really huge difference," he said of adding the Tuthill family name to the pet rescue and resource center at 21 Salt Creek Lane. "We of course want to honor the

people who support us at this level. It's an important thing to say thank you."

But the name does much more, he explained.

"It really adds credibility to the work we're doing to have a family that is so well-known and so well-established to show they support us," he said.

Jay said he and his sisters, Sue and Ann, fully supported their mother's decision to make the donation.

"The more we talked about it, the more we knew she

should do it now while she's still very much alive and able to enjoy the heck out of it," he said. "While Mom is ducking every opportunity to accept any 'credit' for her donation, that doesn't mean she isn't on cloud nine as a result of the gift."

The donation will help cover a few expenses associated with the renovation of the building, which opened in November, Van Winkle said. But most of it will go toward caring for animals who stay there, such as the six dogs and 20 cats who arrived Saturday morning after being displaced by floods caused by Hurricane Barry. The animals were expected to be available for adoption this week, pending veterinary exams.

"Mom literally yearns for more pets to have their own human families," Jay said.

Florrie's love and concern for rescue animals was evident when she first toured the new center with Van Winkle and her son. "It took us a good hour to take her through the facility," Van Winkle said. "That was not because she had any mobility problems. It's because every single one of our pets got a personal hello from her. She was such a sweet woman."

Van Winkle said he hopes Florrie knows how grateful everyone at the humane society is for her generosity.

"Her gift is making a huge difference to our animals," he said. "We just can't say thank you enough."

## **State EPA holds public meeting on Sterigenics**

The Illinois EPA has scheduled a formal public meeting to accept oral comments on a draft construction permit to place significant new controls on ethylene oxide emissions at the Sterigenics facility located at 7775 Quincy St. in Willowbrook.

The meeting will be held from 6 to 9 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 1, at Ashton Place, 341 75th St., Willowbrook.

Under the draft permit, Sterigenics would install new emission controls, place the building under 100 percent capture (negative air pressure) and route all emission sources at the facility through pollution control devices. The draft permit includes a limit on ethylene oxide use as well as performance requirements for the capture system and control devices, and a limit on emissions from the facility of 85 pounds per year. The draft permit also requires emissions testing and the installation of state-of-the-art emissions monitoring.

The draft document can be found at the Illinois EPA website at www2.illinois.gov/epa > website topic list > community relations > site fact sheets > ethylene oxide.

Ethylene oxide is a flammable, colorless gas produced and use to make a range of products and to sterilize some medical equipment that cannot be sterilized by other methods. In December 2016, the U.S. EPA updated its Integrated Risk Information System value for ethylene oxide, revising the descriptor from "probably carcinogenic to humans" to "carcinogenic to humans" and indicating a 30-fold increase in cancer potency.

Elected leaders from Hinsdale and four other towns have opposed any settlement that would permit the existing seal order to be lifted or allow the use of ethylene oxide or any similar chemical in the area.

The Illinois EPA also will accept written comments concerning the draft permit until Aug. 15. Email comments to EPA.Sterigenics@illinois.gov.

### Dancer stretches to reach new heights

Ballerina Grace Koznarek made her debut in "The Nutcracker" at age 11, assigned to multiple roles, from soldier to angel to Bon-bon.

But there was a bit of a boo-boo with the Bon-bon.

"I was looking for my hat, and I completely missed my stage time. I was super-crushed," Koznarek recounted.

Thankfully that disappointment was eclipsed by the enchantment of the experience. Now 16, Koznarek has become the source of enchantment, taking first place in classical dance — one of the youngest in her category — at the prestigious Youth America Grande Prix in March in Indianapolis.

That triumph earned her a coveted invite to the New York Finals in April, open to only 150 girls internationally and attended by representatives of the world's leading dance companies in search of talent.

"I got picked as a top 22 out of all those girls," Koznarek said. "We got to dance on the same stage the New York City Ballet dances on. I almost cried."

It's been an impressive ascent

for the Hinsdale resident who discovered ballet relatively late in her childhood.

"I always kind of danced in the basement, but I never actually took any dance training," Koznarek said.

Her remarkable aptitude for learning new steps stunned instructors at Hinsdale Dance Academy.

"Teachers would say, 'I don't know how you just did that, and I don't think you know how you did that,' " she related. "I ended up moving (from Level 2) to Level 4 halfway through the year."

Ballet soon evolved from a passing interest to a passion, one that could be a lifelong pursuit. At age 12, Koznarek was dazzling judges at competitions in both contemporary and classical performances.

"I was told that people cried," she said. "That was a crazy thing to hear, that I moved people like that after just a year and a half."

Koznarek caught the eye of ballet's elite in New York, receiving multiple offers from troupes in the U.S. and Europe, and was even asked to try out for The Royal Ballet.

"I flew to London and got to do a three-day audition," Koznarek said. "Those were probably the most magical three days of my life."

Ultimately she accepted a full scholarship to study for a year at The State Ballet School of Berlin. She leaves in a couple weeks with her mom, Margaret, and younger brother, who will stay with her.

"I realized I could do what I wanted to do but on a higher scale than I ever thought before," she said.

A principal dancer with Berlin is Iana Salenko, a redhead with bangs standing about 5 feet 2 inches tall, just like Koznarek. "So I've always felt a little bit of a

connection," she smiled. Connecting her heart with audience members through dance is

what Koznarek most loves to experience. "What it's really about is the joy of movement and the joy of move-

of movement and the joy of movement that you convey to others," she said.

### Donated cord blood can become someone's lifeline

July is Cord Blood Awareness Month in the U.S., a designation with the purpose of encouraging expectant parents to save a newborn's cord blood.

Cord blood, found in the blood of the umbilical cord, can be used to treat more than 70 diseases, according to the American Health Council, including blood cancers like leukemia and lymphoma as well as to promote tissue regeneration. Expectant parents have several options when donating cord blood:

• Donate to a public cord blood bank. When you donate to a public cord blood bank, your baby's cord blood is available to any patient who needs a transplant. Check with your hospital to see if it is able to collect umbilical cord blood for storage in public banks. There is no cost because public cord blood banks cover the fees associated with processing, testing and storing donated cord blood. The blood is collected under strict quality standards to make sure the cord blood unit is usable for transplant. If standards aren't met, the cord blood unit might be used for research to improve the transplant process for future patients or be discarded.

• Store in a family (private) cord blood bank. Family cord blood banks typically store cord blood exclusively for use by the family. A collection fee and annual storage fees are usually required. This is good option in cases where a sibling has a medical need that may be treated with a cord blood transplant. Collecting and storing cord blood for sibling-directed donation is offered at little or no cost to eligible families. Contact a participating public cord blood bank or a family cord blood bank.

Be The Match, a national marrow donor

program, reports that 11 percent of transplant patients receive cord blood that was donated to a public cord blood bank. Cord blood is one of three sources of blood-forming cells used in transplants, with the others being bone marrow and peripheral blood stem cells.

The cells are taken from the baby's umbilical cord and placenta after the baby is born; blood is not taken from the baby. In the case of a twin pregnancy, the cord blood cells are not eligible because they have different tissue types and it's possible the two cord blood units could be mixed up during collection.

So check with your hospital to see if it collects cord blood for a public cord blood bank. If so, consider donating and contact the cord blood bank after the start of your 28th week of pregnancy. Another life may depend on it.

## Apollo 11 anniversary sparks memories, curiosity

I have two distinct memories associated with the July 20, 1969, landing of Apollo 11 on the moon.

The first — which I only recall because I have a photo of the occasion — is a picture of me as a toddler at Santa's Village. I'm sitting on a large purple and pink concrete mushroom holding a newspaper with a front-page headline in all caps.

"PAM LANNOM LANDS ON MOON!" it reads.

We visited the amusement park in August 1970, according to the note my mom wrote in the album, just about a year after Neil Armstrong took those first lunar steps. My parents apparently couldn't pass up a souvenir that also had historical significance.

My other memory is of the 20th anniversary of the moon landing, when the event was the theme of Hinsdale's Independence Day parade. As Kids Club editor for The Doings, I was responsible for creating fliers we would pass out along the parade route. Our goal was to further wow the crowd after they saw the giant papier-mache moon we created for our very clever "It's only a paper moon" float.

The entire package was very impressive. Unfortunately, I made the tiniest of typos and indicated the moon landing was 1989, not 1969. Every person on staff was enlisted to correct the mistake, and 6,000 copies

and several bottles of White Out later, all was well. But it took a long time to live that one down.

On Saturday the nation will celebrate the 50th anniversary of the arrival of Armstrong, Buzz Aldrin and Michael Collins on the moon. In honor of the event, Mental Floss posted 50 facts about the historic event on its website. Here are a few of the ones I found most interesting.

• Had it not been for President John F. Kennedy, Apollo might never have landed on the moon. When the program was announced

to send a small crew into the moon's orbit. Kennedy, in a 1961 speech, made a commitment to land on the moon before the decade was over.

the moon was sold by Sears. Conflicting accounts exist as to which company manufactured the flag, but the website of Glen Raven, a mill in North Carolina, indicates the flag was made there. (My husband works for Glen Raven, so that's what I believe!)

• The astronauts had to fill out expense reports and customs forms after they returned home. Aldrin submitted receipts for \$33.31 in travel expenses incurred on his way to and from Cape Kennedy in Florida.

• It's estimated it took about 400,000 scientists, engineers and technicians to make Apollo 11's mission a success.

## A bit of magic in mundane moments

There are events that we expect to bring joy, to maybe even take our breath away: seeing your adult children dance at their wedding, reaching the mountaintop view after an arduous climb, holding a newborn grandchild.

A hot shower after a 5-day canoe trip.

But I have also come to appreciate the moments that surprise me with magic that I never saw coming. Note: I was anticipating that shower for four days.

These "magic moments" rest in my heart; recalling them soothes my soul.

For instance: Several decades ago, when my two children were still seeing a pediatrician, the three of us exited the doctor's office and spied a brilliant double rainbow stretching north to south in a dark blue eastern sky. We stopped in our tracks and simply stared.

For me, no rainbow before or since has matched the intense colors we saw that day.

Just last October, my husband and I took two of my sisters and a cousin to the North Woods of Wisconsin and the Upper Peninsula of Michigan for a tour of the area's fall colors and numerous waterfalls.

On a chilly gray day, we bundled up and headed for Wisconsin's Copper Falls State Park. Our goal was the Doughboy Trail, built by the Civilian Conservation Corps in the 1930s. The trail includes wonderful views of the Copper and Brownstone

falls, and follows the Bad River and Tyler Forks River. There was a

brisk wind that vanished as the five of us worked our way down into the protection of pine trees. We paused at a lookout to admire

air, and snowflakes began to gently fall. We couldn't help but laugh at the unexpected beauty of the moment.

But it was no surprise this last June when I often felt overwhelmed by emotion while taking part in the 75th anniversary of D-Day in Normandy. Traveling with family members, our mission was to honor all those who served, but especially my dad, a World War II pilot who wrote to his sister about flying the C-47 that led the D-Day invasion.

The plane, named That's All, Brother, had been restored and was flown to Normandy to take part in the special celebration.

When our three days of touring and toasting Dad's memory were over, our little three-car caravan was leaving Normandy when we suddenly spotted a lone C-47 flying overhead, as if in salute and sending us on our way.

Although I don't know for sure that it was That's All, Brother, I like to think it was a message from my dad, saying thanks for coming. I'll say, thanks, Dad, for the

magic moment.

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



#### JOANNA SOHOVICH AND JEFF MEREDITH, CHAMBERLAIN GROUP EXECUTIVES

As JoAnna Sohovich enjoys an evening stroll through her Hinsdale neighborhood, it's not uncommon for her to alert her neighbors to their open garage doors.

If they only had myQ technology, that wouldn't be an issue.

Sohovich is CEO of Chamberlain Group — an Oak Brook-based company that creates Chamberlain and LiftMaster garage door openers, along with the myQ technology that allows consumers to control their doors from anywhere using their phones.

As CEO, Sohovich works closely with president and COO Jeff Meredith. Meredith is not only a colleague, he is also Sohovich's neighbor. But he is one neighbor who never needs a reminder to close his garage. Meredith's garage, like Sohovich's, is equipped with myQ.

MyQ technology has been available for about seven years. In April, Chamberlain launched a new application for the service through a partnership with Amazon.

Amazon and Chamberlain Group have teamed up to offer free in-garage package delivery to Prime customers in 50 metropolitan areas across the country, including Chicago and its suburbs.

Meredith, who was instrumental

in the development and launch of in-garage delivery, said industry research shows that more than 70 percent of Americans who live in a house or townhome take security measures to avoid having a package stolen from their porch or entryway. Now, using myQ technology, Amazon can place packages securely inside a customer's garage, eliminating the risk of theft as well as damage from the weather or pests.

Garage delivery is a highly secure system with several fail safes in place to protect the homeowner, Meredith said.

"There are a lot of safety and security measures," said Sohovich, who noted that delivery drivers never have access to a customer's garage entry code.

Customers receive a phone notification when their package is delivered and another when the garage door closes post-delivery. Drivers are unable to move on to their next delivery until a customer's door is completely shut, Sohovich said.

Homeowners with security cameras can watch the delivery take place. "The service in gaining popularity

very rapidly," Meredith said. Within six to nine months, he said 80 to 90 percent of Amazon Prime customers in the U.S. will have access to in-ga-

rage delivery.

Sohovich said MyQ eliminates the need to keep a garage door opener in you car, which also eliminates the risk that a car burglar might gain access to your home from your car.

Meredith said Amazon already is reporting an upswing in the number and types of items being ordered by myQ customers. They feel safe ordering everything from toilet paper, which could be damaged by rain, to more expensive items, which could attract thieves.

"Thousands of packages are being delivered to garages each day," Meredith said.

Chamberlain Group also has seen an increase in sales of its myQ hub since the Amazon service was launched. The hub allows people who do not have a myQ smart-garage door opener to utilize the technology.

Meredith said he sees the potential for additional uses of the technology. For instance, homeowners who have refrigerators in their garages may one day have groceries delivered.

Meredith, who joined the company just a year ago, said he's excited about the new conveniences the company is developing.

"It's a fun time to be here," he said. — by Sandy Illian Bosch

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## **Getting crafty**

### Microbreweries find their niche in nearby communities

Craft breweries have been popping up at a head-spinning pace in recent years, pouring out inventive takes on trendy IPAs and old-guard Pilsners along with stunning stouts, crazy kolsches and other varieties offering taste sensations for those who come to belly up.

Hinsdale residents have a wide array to choose from within a short drive, which we'll explore in this three-part, geographically organized series leading up to International Beer Day on Aug. 2. So raise a pint and quench your thirst in unexpected ways.

#### **Alter Brewing**

This craft pub crawl kicks off at the series' western edge, and at the top

of the alphabet, with Alter Brewing in Downers Grove. Huge, gleaming, fully exposed beer tanks tower over the spacious taproom as warm summer air wafts in through an open garage door composing the facade, lending the place an almost tropical vibe.

Co-founder and brewer Mark Hedrick made beer at home for years before turning his hobby into a livelihood with this establishment in December of 2015. Others shared his passion.

There were 2,700 breweries in America when we opened our doors. As of today there are 7,400, and well over 2,000 in planning," Hedrick said.

Behind a long counter are roughly a dozen taps bearing names including Dank You, After Party and, naturally, ALTERior Motive IPA.

One called Hell Hazed Over hits a

nerve with Hedrick.

"I put my foot in my mouth when I said we're never going to make a hazy beer," he admitted, alluding to the hazy IPA fad.

Customer lobbying won out. Catering to patrons is paramount, he stressed, from keeping the joint clean to ensuring staff know their stuff.

"Educating our guests, whether they're novices or experts, really helps with their experience here," Hedrick said.

While craft beer enthusiasts can be loyal, they also like fresh output. Hedrick said Alter takes pride in the constant renewal of their tap offerings.

"We have about four beers that we brew year-round. We have about six seasonals, and then we've got

dozens of one-offs and small batch stuff," he said. "We're constantly trying to innovate. You have to."

The warehouse in back doubles as event space for parties. A full-service brew pub in St. Charles is in the offing.

Hedrick advised guests should come with an open mind and avail themselves of free samples before picking their pint.

"Every brewer wants to make a delicious product, just like a chef wants you to enjoy your meal."

#### **Whiskey Hill Brewing**

Marshmallow and graham cracker cereal in beer? That's what flavors 5 S'mores Minutes from Whiskey Hill Brewing in Westmont. And, yes, there's cacao mixed in as well to deliver the complete campfire delight in imperial milk stout form.

Co-owner Matt Weil, a Hinsdale Central grad, bought the brewery last year after it had gone through previous iterations. Tucked back in a industrial park just north of 63rd Street, patrons arrive because they know what | they're looking for.

"We rebuilt the whole place and relaunched as Whiskey Hill," said Weil, noting the name was the Prohibition-era nickname for Westmont.

Whiskey is not on the pour list, but one-of-a-kind flavors certainly are.

"I thought, "Let's brew this crazy stuff that people haven't done and show people a whole different side of regional American craft beer," he said.

Apps like Untapped and Heritage Corridor Ale Trail lead craft beer devotees to their hideout. Ron Brown and Brian Szady made the trip from South Elgin in pursuit of mashing masterpieces.

"It used to be that beer, more or less, had one sort of taste," Brown said. "To find out that beer is actually a huge variety of things is just incredible."

Weil said response has been fantastic and expansion plans are in the works to keep up with demand.

"If you've got good product, people are coming to see you. We've been very lucky," he said The tap room is dog friend-

ly, and he delights in seeing young families come toting food and drinks for the little ones. Seeing people pick up





crowlers, or extra large cans, to take to parties instead of going to the liquor store also has been gratifying for Weil.

#### "I'm really proud of the brand we've built so far," he remarked. "It's been fun being on the ground level."

#### **Orange & Brew**

Back in Downers Grove, Orange & Brew Bottle Shop is providing a portal to, well, porters, sours and other products from brewers across the area. The 6-month-old business sells packaged products and has a tap room where customers can try styles from multiple local brewers in one sitting.

"This helps kind of narrow down (the choices) for people," said proprietor Eric Schmidt.

The name, as Fighting Illini faithful might surmise, honors Schmidt's University of Illinois alma mater. Upon entering one sees wall of shelves to the right crammed with some 360 bottled or canned beers to go, primarily from Midwest brewers.

"The first two shelves are local, then we go Michigan/ Indiana with the next two," he said.

The tap room area features a wraparound counter and stools, with tables on the other side.

"We've got eight draft

There's a beer for every palate at Orange & Brew in Downers Grove, whether from the extensive selection of packaged products or served up by owner Eric Schmidt from the taps featuring styles from local breweries.

lines for beer," Schmidt said. "I always try to do a nice, approachable Pilsner and then feature a couple others, trying to randomize the styles."

The small kegs employed empty fast, keeping the clientele on their toes.

"People like that every time they come in, there's something different," he said. "They like the variety." Despite the Illini theme,

Despite the Illini theme, don't get Orange & Brew confused for a sports bar.

"We're not a belly-up, watchfour-hours-of-football type of place," he said.

Daily business hours start at noon; it's closed on Mondays.

"Once the trains start coming in around 4 p.m. on Friday, we'll fill up for happy hour," he said. "It's a good, laid-back crowd."

A customer requests a 5-ounce glass of Milkshake Waka Raspberry, an IPA from Energy City Brewing out of Batavia. Perhaps his next pour will be served at the source.

"Were trying to be a place where you can come try some local things, say, 'I really like that' and then go visit that brewery to go try more," Schmidt said. "That's our goal."
