D86 referendum final costs tallied

Hinsdale High School District 86 finally closed the books on the Future Ready Facilities projects voters approved in April 2019.

The district spent \$167.6 million on a long list of projects at both high schools, almost \$27.8 million more than the \$139.8 million listed in the referendum.

Most of the additional spending — almost \$17.9 million — came from premiums on the \$138.9 million in tax-exempt municipal bonds the district sold.

"Municipal bonds will generally always sell at a premium," said Josh Stephenson, chief financial officer for the district. "I don't think it's significantly dependent on current market conditions." The 20-year bonds were sold in three separate amounts over two years. The first sale of \$62.3 million in 2019 generated \$70 million in proceeds. The second sale of \$31.5 million in 2019 generated \$34.9 million, and the third sale of \$45.2 million in 2020 generated \$50.9 million.

Interest income on the proceeds totaled \$2.7 million.

The district also received money from outside sources. Community members raised \$1.6 million to put toward the cost of the new Don Watson Aquatic Center at Hinsdale Central. The district also received \$100,000 from Sterigenics as part of a lawsuit settlement. Quest Food Management, which has a seven-year contract with the district, provided \$143,722 for capital purchases. "In exchange for doing a longer-term contract, they also put in a capital investment," Stephenson said.

"They bought all the equipment that went into the cafés/coffee shops at both campuses."

Operating funds totaling \$6.9 million also were used toward projects as well, with the largest line items being Phase 3 period 4 bids that exceeded the budget (\$2.3 million) and infilling and renovating the pool at Central (\$1.6 million).

Almost \$142 million of the total went to Pepper Construction, which oversaw the project and paid most of the contractors.

"I think there was over 100 different bid packages throughout the referendum period," Stephenson said.

Among firms with whom the

district contracted directly, Arcon Associates received \$9.9 million for architect and engineering fees, while a little more than \$2.9 million went to Lowery McDonnell Co. for furniture. Fieldturf USA Inc. was paid almost \$2 million and DCG Roofing Solutions Inc. almost \$1.3 million, and the district also arranged the installation of low-voltage wiring in order to receive "e-rate" reimbursement from the federal government, Stephenson said.

The District 86 finance committee reviewed the final numbers at its Nov. 13 meeting. Stephenson said there wasn't any new information.

"All these conversations we've had many times before," he said. "I don't think there is anything in here that was unknown or surprising. It's just a summation of everything that occurred."

Among other business Nov. 21, board members:

• discussed a proposed intergovernmental agreement with the village of Clarendon Hills regarding the proposed tax increment financing district along 55th Street. The Jewel-Osco and PNC bank are no longer part of the TIF, according to a plan the Clarendon Hills Village Board approved Monday night. The district will have its legal team review the IGA, which provides the district with some TIF revenue, and the board will discuss it again at its Dec. 19 board meeting.

"We can decide if we want to accept their IGA or not, which would then give us some revenue, or we could say, 'No, we don't want this IGA,' and then we don't get that revenue but the TIF keeps going regardless of what we do," Superintendent Mike Lach said.

• voted to sunset the German program at both high schools due to declining enrollment and difficulty finding staff. Current freshmen are the final class that will be able to enroll in German 1. The board also voted to add American Sign Language, which is taught at Hinsdale South, at Hinsdale Central.

• voted to add an "earned honors credit" option to four electives that will no longer have an honors option (three journalism classes and the tech support internship) and to five electives that have not had an honors option (two acting classes, child care and development, culinary 2 and marketing) for the 2025-26 school year

• heard a brief report on the Illinois School Report cards from Jason Markey, assistant superintendent for academics. Report cards are available through a link on the district's website at www.hinsdale86.org/departments/academics.

• listened to a report from Scott Duenser of Wipfli LLP, the district's auditor, indicating his firm gave a clean opinion on the district's annual comprehensive financial report.

"The district goes above and beyond in putting this report together," he said.

• heard an athletic performance participation report for Hinsdale Central and Hinsdale South high schools, At Central, 32 percent of students were on a fall athletic team, and 43 percent of freshmen chose to play a sport.

"It's really great to see our kids involved," athletic director Mike Jezioro said.

• voted 6-1 to approve the 2025-26 program of studies. Board member Jeff Waters voted no because it does not include an honors world history class at Hinsdale South.



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
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

Hinsdale police list results of campaign

The Hinsdale Police Department reported the following enforcement outcomes from its "Click It or Ticket" and "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" traffic safety campaign from Nov. 22 to Dec. 2. During the campaign, the police made three DUI arrests and issued 45 speeding citations along with recording two criminal arrests, one traffic arrest and nine other traffic citations.

The Thanksgiving safety enforcement mobilization was carried out in collaboration with state and local law enforcement agencies across Illinois to reduce fatalities. "We issue tickets to remind drivers and passengers that seat belt use isn't a suggestion, it's the law," said Deputy Chief Thomas Lillie. "This year's campaign was successful in grabbing people's attention with highly visible enforcement methods. As always, our goal is a safe community with safe drivers."

Field trip leads teen to Eagle Scout project

Greg Warren remembers visiting the Hinsdale History Museum on an elementary school field trip.

"I went there in second grade and I loved it," he said. Earlier this year, when he was thinking about potential Eagle Scout projects, the Hinsdale Historical Society

came to mind. "I really wanted to do something that would be lasting, that would be meaningful to me and the community and that would be meaningful to the sponsor of the project," Warren said. "Something that came to mind was the Hinsdale Historical Society. I reached out to them, asking if they had any projects that needed to be done, and they said they would like this refresh of the museum room."

Warren and his crew did extensive work on the exhibit room on the third floor of the museum at 15 S. Clay St. They removed old cabinets, packaged artifacts for storage, washed the wallpaper and floors, sanded and painted trim and replaced and repaired windows.

Rather than buying new cabinets, Warren repurposed donated curio cabinets.

"We were able to install

them into the museum room to bring new life, new energy into the space," he said.

The project also benefited from gifts of paint and other supplies from JC Licht, along with the help of volunteers.

"A lot of my fellow scouts were able to come out and support me, some parents, some siblings, some siblings' friends, so the community was really able to get behind it."

He began planning the project in June and spent about two weeks working on the room, six days of which were particularly active. As is often the case with construction projects, he hit some snags along the way. One involved repairing a window that wouldn't open.

"Some of the parts had been stolen, so we had to obtain some new parts, which were hard to come by," he said.

And one of the curio cabinets didn't fit the space — literally.

"We had this beautiful cabinet that was donated and it was unable to fit up in the room," he said. "We moved it to Immanuel Hall, where it now serves as a gift shop."

Warren fondly reflected on the decade of growth that's resulted from his Troop 52

membership.

"I love the community, the leadership skills I develop and the friends I make along the way," he said.

He also has gone on two High Adventure trips, one to Philmont Scout Ranch in New Mexico and one to Sea Base in the Florida Keys. He spent seven days hiking in the mountains and a week on a boat on these excursions. "I think it was life changing," Warren said of the experiences. "It was really meaningful to me. I formed lifelong bonds with people I was on the trip with. I really was grateful for my experience to be able to carry my home on my back and go outside of my comfort zone and get these amazing, amazing experiences," he said. Even though he has achieved the highest rank available in Boy Scouts, he will remain an active member of Troop 52.

Growing up, Violet Eck could often be found ensconced in the pages of a "Fancy Nancy" adventure or a selection from the "I Survived" book series.

"Like 'I Survived the Great Depression.' I loved those, they were my favorites when I was little," Eck said.

Now as a busy Hinsdale Central senior, Eck lamented the challenge of carving out recreational reading time. But knowing how formative stimulating literature was in her childhood, she wants to help provide nascent readers access to books.

She, along with fellow Central senior Alec Trainer, have spearheaded a book drive in partnership with Bernie's Book Bank to collect new or gently used children's books and deliver them to under-served children throughout the Chicagoland. The drive began in mid-October and continues through Jan. 7 (see Page XX for details).

are really grateful and amazed that we have so many books," said Eck, who also helped with last year's book drive, which garnered 500 books.

The hope is to exceed that number this year. With a reported two out of three Chicago-area children lacking books, drives like this can combat that deficiency, Eck said. Personally, she tries to make up for lost school year reading time in the summer.

"I'm always reading by the pool. I enjoy fun, exciting books, so I think that is was an important thing for me, especially going to such a good high school and being able to get whatever books I need."

And even with her proficiency on e-devices, Eck said she still prefers curling up with a good old hardcopy edition in her hands.

"I like flipping the pages. I think an actual book is just more satisfying to finish," Eck remarked.

And she likes extending that enjoyment to others.

"I think it's essential to have that basic education (through reading) and be able to step into another world when you're reading a book," she said.

The Christmas Walk is comin' to town

Hinsdale Chamber, local businesses, Santa getting ready for official holiday kick-off

Break out those long johns and parkas and prepare to enjoy Hinsdale's traditional kickoff to the holiday season this Friday, Dec. 6, from 5 to 7 p.m.

Presented by the Hinsdale Chamber of Commerce and Bella Cosa Jewelers, the 58th annual Hinsdale Christmas Walk will take place in the heart of the village and feature wintery wonders and treats for all, said Amanda Wagner, marketing director for the chamber.

The evening will begin with the three lighting ceremony on the lawn of the Memorial Building, led by Village President Tom Cauley.

"There are many things I like about being village president. The tree-lighting ceremony every December is near the top of the list," Cauley said, noting that he has missed only one Christmas Walk in the last 15 years.

"I enjoy greeting Santa

when he comes to village hall in the fire truck and the parents and kids counting down to when I light the tree. It's kind of a Norman Rockwell moment."

Cauley revealed that the button he pushes to light the tree doesn't really work — a message is relayed to an engineer in the basement of the Memorial Building to turn on the lights. "For the last 15 years it's worked out perfectly," he said. "I hope it works this year, too."

Across the tracks, 25 to 30 local businesses and organizations will occupy tents along Hinsdale's downtown streets, which will be closed to vehicular traffic.

"The downtown area will have a lot of people walking around," said Hinsdale resident Joseph Molfese, owner of Bella Cosa Jewelers. The annual Christmas Walk is one of the many things he and his family enjoy about Hinsdale, and he said he's excited to participate again this year. Early visitors to the Bella Cosa tent can take home a commemorative Hinsdale ornament to add to their home holiday decor.

"We definitely have a limited number," said Molfese, whose tent will be located near the carousel on First Street just west of Washington Street. Maltese said the event is a chance to give back to the community that supports his business, and to introduce Bella Cosa Jewelers to potential new customers just in time for the holidays.

The carousel has become a perennial attraction at the Christmas Walk, along with the trackless train. After some technical issues last year, Wagner said the chamber has been promised the train will run smoothly down First Street throughout this year's event.

Many participating businesses and organizations will have giveaways, treats, hot beverages, games and crafts to share, along with information about their products and missions. "They're just trying to get the word out there,"

Wagner said. Hinsdale residents,

neighbors, families and friends aren't the only ones who will be strolling the streets of Hinsdale during the walk.

"You might see some familiar faces," said Wagner, including the Grinch himself.

"He'll be here throughout the entire event," Wagner said.

Downtown restaurants will be open during the walk, along with some shops and storefronts where visitors can gather for dinner, do a little holiday shopping or just warm up a bit before taking in the rest of the Christmas Walk.

Guests also can warm up around King Landscaping's fire pit, located near Phillip's Flowers and Gifts on Washington Street.

Wagner said Tesla plans to have a vehicle on display. Holiday displays will light up the storefronts and tents, turning downtown Hinsdale into a festive winter market.

Of course, no Christmas Walk would be complete without the chance to visit with Santa himself. After lighting the village tree, Santa will receive visitors at his workshop in Burlington Park until 7 p.m. For those who don't get the chance to visit with Mr. Claus on Friday, he will return to the workshop from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturdays, Dec. 7, 14 and 21.


Hinsdale for the Holidays

Black and white bourbon balls make spirits bright

December is here and the holiday baking season is in full swing at my house. However, one of my favorite holiday desserts is also one of the simplest to make. Bourbon balls are a classic Southern dessert. They have a rich velvety chocolate flavor that makes them irresistibly good. They are always a hit with guests and they don't



require baking.

Bourbon balls are said to have been first created by the Rebecca Ruth Candy Co. in Frankfort, Ken., in 1938. There are lots of different versions of this recipe, but most are made from vanilla wafer cookies, coco powder and bourbon. As a kid I remember one of my mom's friends

would always bring us a

little bowl or tin of these for Christmas. They were so good that they had to be rationed out so they didn't disappear all at once.

My recipe is adapted from "Julia Reed's South: Spirited Entertaining and High Style Fun All Year Long." Reed was a celebrated journalist and foodie who was known for her entertaining. These black and white bourbon balls were her signature Christmas party dessert. She served them in a large footed bowl and would even send them home with guests in little cellophane bags as a treat.

When making these bourbon balls, I use the Nabisco Nilla wafer brand cookies because the store brand cookies just can't compare. I also like to use a good bourbon, like Maker's Mark or Michter's, because you can taste the difference.

This festive little dessert has a way of disappearing quickly, so I usually make several batches for the holiday season. I love making them for a party because they can be made ahead of time. The black and white powdered sugar and pecan topping contrast gives them an easy elegant touch. So, add a little merry to your holiday season with my Southern bourbon balls.

• 1 (12oz) box Nabisco Nilla Wafers

• 2 tablespoons cocoa powder • 1½ cup confectioners' sugar, divided

• 1½ cup finely chopped pecans, divided

• 2 tablespoons light corn syrup

• 1/2 cup bourbon

First, crush the Nilla wafers and the pecans. Place the Nilla wafers in a food processor. Then pulse at a high speed until the wafers are finely and

evenly crushed. Then pour the crumbs in a large mixing bowl and set aside. Next, pulse the pecans in the food processor until they are finely chopped. Place 1 cup of the chopped pecans in the bowl with the cookie crumbs and reserve the remaining $\frac{1}{2}$ cup for rolling the balls.

Now in the bowl with the cookie crumbs and pecans mix, in 2 tablespoons cocoa powder, 1 cup of powdered sugar, 2 tablespoons of corn syrup and ½ cup of bourbon. Mix with a rubber spatula until well combined. Then evenly scoop and shape the cookie crumb mixture into small 2 tablespoon-sized balls. Using a small 1¾ inch cookie scoop makes it easy to create evenly shaped cookie balls.

Finish the bourbon balls by rolling them in powdered sugar and crushed pecans. Take two plates or shallow bowls and fill one with ½ cup of powdered sugar and the other with ½ cup of the crushed pecans. Roll half of the balls in powdered sugar and then roll the remaining of the balls in pecans. This will give you a classic black and white combination.

This recipe makes 16 bourbon balls. Store them in airtight container in the fridge for up to two weeks.

Head coach: Alex Hipskind

Seasons as head coach: 23 No. team members: 15 Team strengths: We've got a group of nice kids, and I think every kid wants to get better

Areas for growth: We're looking for an increased level of commitment and consistency among the team in order for us to be more competitive.

Who to watch: Newcomer senior Alex Rivera is a natural leader that kids gravitate to. I think he's primarily a baseball player but was able to make it work with bowling this year. Junior Will Egbert is a great kid, very positive and very committed. He comes to every practice, every match, and he's improved every single year I've had him.

Outlook: We're trying to get guys to not focus on the team's record but rather on being a better bowler every single day. We want them to open up their minds and listen to the coaches in the hopes that they improve. We have several freshmen, and I'm excited that they're in the program. A couple have solid 120 averages, which is pretty good, and we are hoping that they remain with us for the next three years.

Girls bowling

First match: Dec. 3 vs. Neuqua Valley (V lost 1,569-1,860)

Last season: 9th in regional Head coach: Paul Parpet

Seasons as head coach: 10 No. team members: nine Team strengths: We have some nice kids, and it's a good group that wants to continue to get better.

Areas for growth: We have some girls that have never bowled before and so you have to start from square one to help them learn the fundamentals: aiming, approach and follow-through, and to have the mentality that you're only as good as your next shot.

Who to watch: senior Chi Chi Oranu is our sole returning bowler. She won the Red Devil Award last season for best team spirit. She's always on her game and does a great job of supporting her teammates. Newcomers that should be good for us are seniors Katherine Choe, Aurora Allen, freshman Kirsten Young and junior Gabby Kawa.

Outlook: Bowling is a game of learning to make adjustments, but it can take a while to get the techniques down. We face good competition, so more than just results I hope they enjoy the experience and keep working to get better.

Boys swimming

First meet: Dec. 6 vs. Waubonsie Valley Last season: state champion Head coach: Bob Barber Seasons as head coach: 11 No. team members: 28 Team strengths: The boys have done the right things to set themselves up for a state title three-peat this season. Our top four or five kids can really do any of the events, which makes it harder to make decisions but at the same time is very convenient. We have depth but we also have really intelligent kids.

Areas for growth: Probably one of our greatest challenges is going to be fitting in all the pieces to the puzzle and knowing which role each kid is going to play. We know right away what kids are good at or not good at certain events, but we want to move them around and keep them fresh so they're not just doing the same thing over and over again.

Who to watch: Senior and Indiana University-bound Josh Bey has done so many different things for our team and is one of those versatile pieces that we can put virtually anywhere. Senior Henry Guo has broken school records and is likely to compete in the individual medley or the butterfly or backstroke. Junior Matt Vatev is the state record holder in the 50-meter breaststroke, and his brother, sophomore Luke Vatev, won a handful events and will be a force to be reckoned with by the end of the season. Seniors Frankie Adamo and Noah Pelinkovic and junior Brandon Suliga are all returning state qualifiers.

Outlook: Hinsdale Central currently owns six of the 11 state swimming records. There's nothing less than another state championship in our minds. That would put us in very elite company, but we'll have to hit on all cylinders to pull it off. I think we have a group that is talented enough to do it.
